National math results add up to good news for New Jersey

New results from the most recent National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) give New Jersey reason to cheer. Math scores for both fourth and eighth grade students in the Garden State again rank among the best in the nation. New Jersey eighth graders were among a handful across the nation to post significant gains on this year's test, and trailed only students in Massachusetts and Minnesota. Fourth graders trailed only

students from four other states. Both groups posted scores significantly above the national average.

NJEA president Barbara Keshishian hailed the results. "New Jersey's emphasis on preparing students for success in the 21st century continues to pay off. We know that strong math skills, and the critical thinking ability that math helps foster, will put our students at an advantage as they

finish school and enter the job market. I am especially encouraged by the success of our older students, which comes as the first wave of students who had broad access to high quality preschool reach eighth grade. Test scores don't tell the whole story of the good things happening in our schools, but these results show that our approach is working."

FAST to sponsor achievement gaps workshop

An Oct. 1 report released from the Center on Education Policy shows that the achievement gap continues to shrink in New Jersey's schools. *State Test Score Trends Through 2007-08* shows encouraging progress toward eliminating the achievement gaps between African American, Latino and low-income students, and their classmates.

The report noted that in New Jersey, "With just one exception, achievement gaps for African-American, Latino and low-income students narrowed in reading and math at the elementary levels."

In July, the *Christian Science Monitor* called New Jersey a bright spot in narrowing the achievement gap between African-American and white students.

To build on New Jersey's success, NJEA Families and Schools Together Work for Children (NJEA FAST) will present "Strategies for Closing Achievement Gaps" on Nov. 21 at NJEA Headquarters in Trenton.

This workshop is focused on helping members to be effective advocates in closing the achieve-

ment gaps for culturally linguistic and economically diverse students. Participants will learn ways to apply NEA's research-based C.A.R.E. themes (culture, abilities, resilience and effort) when working as practitioners and while engaging families and community.

Members who attend the entire workshop are eligible to receive professional development credit.

Pre-registration is required by Nov. 9.

The following is an excerpt from Jon Corzine's essay on education. Jon Corzine is the only choice for educators.

"Next to fixing the economy, nothing has been more important to me during my four years in office than educating our children. As we faced a global recession in a year of declining revenues, our funding for education increased because I believe we have an obligation to provide adequate funding for public

education. The reason is simple. Children only get one shot at being a child — one chance at a quality education.

An investment in education is an investment in the economic well-being of New Jersey. Companies come to New Jersey or remain in the state if there is a well-educated workforce that can meet the company's needs. For years, this state has had a reputation for having such a workforce. By spending wisely on

education, that tradition will continue. That is why I have refused to cut state aid to education. Across the board, communities in this state saw their state education aid go up or remain level this year — a remarkable accomplishment given the economic downturn the state faced."
